**Blazon.** On a disc Azure, issuant from base a demi-sphere Celeste, edged and gridlined Sable, charged with a cross in perspective palewise Gules, as a runway garnished Argent, fimbriated of the third, surmounted in chief a caduceus of the fifth, edged of the third, with the lower portion of the staff of the fourth, issuing two speed lines chevronwise of the fifth; all within a narrow border Yellow.

Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "PREVENTION IS BETTER THAN CURE" in Yellow letters.

Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "56TH AEROSPACE MEDICINE SQ" in Yellow letters.

Motto. Prevention Is Better Than Cure.

**Significance.** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The red cross represents strength within the medical arena as well as the "blanket" of medical commitment provided by unit personnel to both flying and non-flying military members. The caduceus, the symbolic staff of a herald, is at the point of the futuristic aircraft. This position signifies that the unit is ready to supply aeromedical support to aircrews, personnel and the environment elements of space. The earth signifies the worldwide commitment of peacekeeping and the environmental protection of air, water and land.

## Narrative.

The unit was constituted as the 56th Aerospace Medicine Squadron on 21 March 1994 and activated on 1 April 1994 at Luke AFB, Arizona, and assigned to the 56th Medical Group. On 15 July 2019, the unit was redesignated as the 56th Operational Medical Readiness Squadron and absorbed the duties of the 56th Dental Squadron. Today, the squadron provides routine medical care to the base flying population and their dependents. Personnel eligible for medical care include pilots, navigators, air traffic controllers, flight engineers, and all personnel and their dependents that hold a 1042 clearance to fly.
